Author Guidelines



The journal *Algologia* publishes articles containing new, previously unpublished data. Every article that is submitted to the Journal is reviewed by the scientific editor for scientific merit and potential impact on the field, plus conformity to the editorial policy and to the style of the Journal. Papers meeting these requirements are then anonymously peer-reviewed. In contentious cases, two or more independent reviewers are envisaged. Papers that do not meet these requirements will be rejected-without-review.

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Manuscripts should be sent to the editorial office (*algologia@ukr.net*) in a Word text editor (font Newton, size 14, line spacing 1.5). The title and the names of all authors (given below the title) should be typed in upper case. Below the names, the address(es) of professional affiliation for each author should be given each starting on a separate line. E-mail address(es) should be provided if available. Affiliation addresses are linked to the author names by numbers in superscript and are provided in corresponding order.

The volume of the **manuscript**, including literature, tables (up to 5) and figures (up to 6), should not exceed 14 pages, list of taxa – no more than 2-3 pages. In exceptional cases, submission of manuscripts up to 24 pages is possible. The presentation of voluminous materials in the form of electronic applications is welcome.

The article should have **sections**: "Abstract", "Introduction", "Materials and Methods", "Results and Discussion", "Conclusions" or "Conclusion", the purpose of the work is clearly identified.

The **abstract** should be presented in the language of the paper (up to 1900 characters) with a brief description of the contents of the article headings. No taxon author names are to be included in the abstract. Introductory information should not be included in the abstract, neither should be the citation of references.

Keywords (up to 10 words) should reflect the basic concepts discussed in the article and (if necessary) geographic data binding.

Citation. All literary references cited in the text of the article are given in brackets with the date of publication in chronological order (Geitler, 1925, 1932; Hindak, Lukeshova, 1991; Smith et al., 2007). All citations in the text must be included in the reference list and vice versa.

Illustrations should be sharp and contrasting (at least 300 pixels per inch, the recommended format is 12.6 cm wide, 21 cm high). They should also be sent in separate electronic files (jpg-format). On microphotographs indicate the scale using a ruler, in the

figure captions - a transcript of all the symbols, in the graphs on the axes - the size and dimension.

Author(s) of taxon names (from the rank of genus or below) must be provided when the taxon is first mentioned in the text. In the case the taxon is the part of the title, author's name(s) must be given as well.

Italicisation. Generic names and all ranks below are italicised. As well book titles and names of periodicals given in the References.

References. All authors should be listed in alphabetical order. If available, the article's DOI is to be added. References should appear as follows:
